The numbers were down a bit from previous years, with a disappointing number of juniors (only three), so the juniors were incorporated into the main tournament. There was not much action in the first round, with the higher rated players winning every game, and only John Olle had trouble dispatching a determined David Thiele.

Things hotted up in the second round with Andy Miitel holding Cook to a draw, Healey beating Olle, and Perrin providing tough opposition for Booth, although Booth still won. VanRiel won a rook against Barrow, staved off several mating threats, blundered it back again in time pressure, before being forced to exchange into a lost endgame. After watching the end of the game, one player was heard to remark of Barrow, "he was like a ferret, he bit then would not let go!".

Round three saw Booth crush Barrow, Cook grind down Healey, VanRiel defeat Miitel, Olle grind down promising junior, Eric Frescher, and the upset of the tournament, Thiele beating Perrin. In round four Cook lost to Booth, Olle won a pawn against Czuczman, and VanRiel beat Healey, setting up a final round, confrontation between the first and second seeds.

The final round lived up to expectations, Cook won a piece against Thiele, Barrow and Olle were both playing for a draw until Barrow accidentally found a winning line, and after a tense struggle, Booth finally offered VanRiel a draw, and secured the championship yet again.

Great interest was shown by the local newspaper, which sent a photographer around before round two, and published the results with a large photo on page two. Praise should go to Kevin Perrin and Leigh Healey for organising the tournament, and David Schepisi for organising some sponsorship. The Bendigo venue, (at LaTrobe UCNV), proved to be better than the traditional Maryborough venue, and the tournament will be held in Bendigo again next year.


